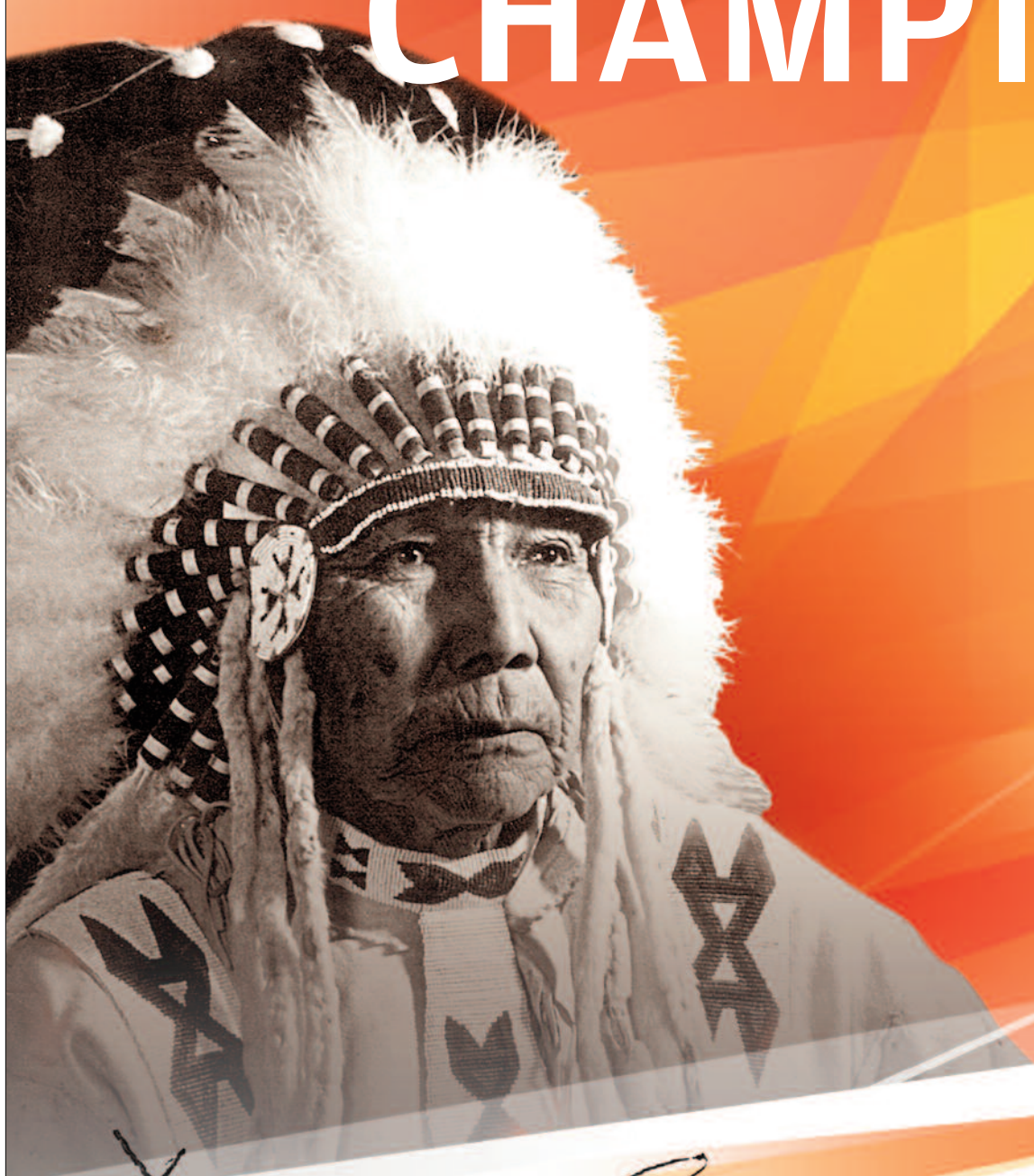


AN ALBERTA CHAMPION

DAVID CROWCHILD 1899-1982

David Crowchild was born on the Tsuut'ina Reserve. He always loved horses, and he competed regularly at First Nations rodeos as well as the chuckwagon races at the Calgary Stampede. His teepee was also encamped every year at the Teepee Village.

He married and had five children with Daisy Dowan Crowchild. Both were committed to creating strong relations between the people of Calgary and the Sarcee First Nations.

Crowchild was one of the founders of the Indian Association of Alberta. In 1946, Crowchild was elected Chief of the Tsuut'ina Reserve. As chief, he created jobs on the reserve and pushed for education, to ensure that they became a prosperous, independent nation.

Crowchild was a wise and distinguished leader who increased the level of acceptance of First Nations in and around the City of Calgary. In response to the honour of having a prominent road named after him, Crowchild said, "May this be a symbol of cutting all barriers between all peoples for all times to come."
