Violet Pauline King was born on October 18 1929. Her parents are John King and Stella King and her siblings are Ted King, Lucille King, and Vern King. King's family faced discrimination In West Hillhurst Community because they were the first black family to move into that neighborhood, a neighbor tried to use a racist petition to keep them out of the area. King went to highschool at Crescent Heights High School, that was when she developed her love and passion for law. In her grade 12 yearbook she wrote "Violet wants to be a criminal lawyer."

When King was pursuing her career, people said many negative things to her, she even made a quote about it "People told me it wasn't a good idea for a girl to become a lawyer, specifically a colored girl, so I went ahead." That's one of the many amazing things about King, she could've let the negativity stop her, but she didn't. This dedicated woman worked as a pianist to finance her studies, she attended The University of Alberta in 1948 and she was one of only three women in the faculty of law!

In 1952 King received her Bachelor of Arts degree, and in 1953 she obtained her LLB degree. And Finally King got titled the first Black Woman to graduate law school in Alberta, and Canada she was the one and only woman in her graduating class! In 1954 June 2 King got called to the Alberta Bar, and became the first black female to practise law in Canada. When she got called to the Alberta bar she made HEADLINES in several local newspapers, people described it as a huge milestone in the history of Canada. Throughout her career she was a strong advocate for women and racial equality.

Violet King did many important, impressive, and inspiring things in her lifetime but sadly, she passed away on March 30, 1982 at the age of 52 from cancer. Even though Violet King passed away, her legacy is still alive, she broke down racial and gender barriers, and was a big part of paving the way for people in future generations who aspire to become a lawyer. Her actions have helped many people, especially people who were afraid of what other people would think if they pursued their dreams. She was living proof that someone's race and gender can't limit someone's potential in the law field.

Violet is a real inspiration to me because one of my dreams is to become a criminal lawyer and learning about this courageous hero gives me confidence to go on with my dream.
